



TOGWOTEE MOUNTAIN LODGE FACT SHEET

LOCATION Togwotee Mountain Lodge is set in North West Wyoming adjacent to Grand Teton National Park and South of Yellowstone National Park on the Eastern rim of Jackson Hole. The lodge is located in the Bridger-Teton National Forest on the side of Angle Mountain at 8,600-foot elevation.

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OVERVIEW & HISTORY

In the year of 1873, Captain Jones of the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers recommended that a road be built over TWO-GWO-TEE Pass to control the lawless whites and warring Indians. The Pass had been named after the Shoshone Indian Guide who scouted the area for Captain Jones. Togwotee means “lance thrower” or “exactly there” from an Indian lance throwing game.

Almost 50 years later, the road crew arrived. Among them were Al and Bertha Angle. Seeing a need for good home cooking, Bertha started making sandwiches and meals to sell to the road crew and any passersby. When the road over the pass opened in 1921, Al and Bertha saw the possibility of building a permanent camp that featured comfortable lodging and home-cooked meals.

The Angles received a 99-year lease from the Forest Service and built Angle’s Camp. They also acquired an outfitting permit and started guiding fishing and hunting trips into the Teton Wilderness. The Angles helped stock many of the lakes and trained many of the outfitters in Jackson Hole. Al used to say, “Well, anyway, a guide



wasn't a tough mountain man till he'd been exposed to schooling at Angle's Camp.

With the abundance of snow, over 600 inches annually, and the fact that it came early and stayed late, this was the biggest cause of problems for the Angles. After 30 years of operating in spite of the winters, they decided to seek a less strenuous way of life and sold their cherished and hard-won business to Harry Moll.

Moll later sold to the Weideman family, who built the existing lodge. They completed the lodge in 1965 and called it Togwotee Mountain Lodge. The old Angle's Camp Lodge was renovated and moved to its present site, the convenience store, in 1982.

There were seven owners of the lodge between the Weideman family and the current owner, ARAMARK Parks and Destinations, purchased it in the spring of 2008.

The long winters, which caused the biggest problems for the Angles, are currently the biggest asset and the most popular season. The arrival of year-round maintenance of the Togwotee Pass road opened up a Winter Wonderland for snowmobilers and cross-country skiers.

Two-and-a-half million acres of National Forest provide a variety of terrain for western deep powder snowmobiling off trail. The Continental Divide Trail System includes 600 miles of groomed trails providing various vistas of the Teton Mountain Range while winding you through the mountain peaks of Togwotee Pass. A short drive to the south entrance to Yellowstone can provide a snowmobile trip to what seems like another planet in the steaming winter scene of the Yellowstone geyser basin. Dogsledding and Cat Skiing are a few of the activities offered at the lodge.

Summer brings an entirely different experience to North West Wyoming. The central location of Togwotee Pass provides for easy access to Grand Teton National Park for fishing, rafting, hiking and boating. A drive through the Tetons to the North will bring you to the South Entrance of Yellowstone and several more adventures. Drive South through the Tetons and enjoy the western small town excitement of the town of Jackson. Horseback riding, hiking and fishing are a few of the activities provided at the lodge.

Togwotee Mountain Lodge's current goals are the same as Al and Bertha Angle's when they built their camp in 1923: to provide good food, comfortable lodging, western hospitality, and the activities necessary for a memorable vacation.



Togwotee Mountain Lodge is open from late May to early October, approximately the same dates as the National Parks' seasons.

In the late fall the lodge closes as the parks prepare for winter and close their roads to wheeled traffic.

Togwotee opens for winter the first of December and closes the first week of April. Yellowstone National Park does not open for snowmobile tours until mid-December and closed mid-March.

The park gates do not close during the season. Operating dates and hours for visitor centers in the park vary widely.

LODGING

The guest units have been well maintained and renovated through the years. The addition of 54 cabins in the early 90's provided our guests with comfortable and cozy accommodations for the longer stay. In the winter packages with meals and activities are available along with transportation from the airport or Jackson. In the summer our program is a -la-carte.

The second floor of the main lodge includes our 28 western pine lodge rooms. These rooms consist of two queen beds, private bathroom, television, coffee maker and telephones. Based on season, rates range from \$89 - \$179.

The suites located on the third floor of the lodge. The mini-suites consist of a small living room with a full-sized sofa sleeper, small dinette table, small refrigerator, microwave, coffee maker, television, telephone, a second room with a queen size bed. Two bunk beds located off the bedroom are perfect for the kids. A two-part bathroom makes the morning routine a little easier with one part including a sink and toilet separated by the other side with a sink and shower. A large walk-in closet allows you to store all your outdoor gear out of the way. Based on season, rates range from \$109 - \$209

Our cabins are located behind the lodge nestled in the pines. We have fifty-four log cabins located a short distance behind the main lodge. All of our cabins have the same floor plan. Twenty of the cabins have fireplaces. All cabins have front porches with picnic tables and outdoor charcoal grills. The cabins have a small living room with a full size sofa sleeper, dinette table, kitchenette unit with a two burner stove, kitchen sink, small refrigerator, microwave, dishes, pots and pans, glasses, silverware, small coffee maker, a bathroom and one bedroom with two queen beds. Each cabin is equipped with two televisions, one in the living room and the other in the bedroom.



They are heated with electric baseboard heat. We have two handicap accessible cabins. Based on season, rates range from \$139-\$239

DINING

The Grizzly Steakhouse – Located on the ground floor of the main lodge is the steakhouse. Enjoy hearty meals of prime steaks, pasta and fish dishes, salads and comfort foods like slow roasted pot roast for dinner. In the winter we serve a full breakfast buffet with all the fixings and lunch with many sandwich options and hot soups. In the summer we serve a breakfast to order and provide box lunches for guests' adventures into the parks.

Red Fox Saloon – Located on the eastern end of the lodge on the ground floor is our fully stocked bar the Red Fox Saloon. With 10 taps of brew and a grill menu guests will be able to relax, refuel and reminisce about the day's adventure.

ACTIVITIES & TOURS

Togwotee Mountain Lodge provides several tours from our location in the winter. We have a few activities onsite in the summer and book several other activities for our guests in the Jackson Hole Region.

During the winter we provide guided or unguided snowmobile trips on our brand new fleet of snowmobiles. TML operates the largest snowmobile rental fleet in North America. We can provide the most docile scenic trail ride to the most extreme backcountry adventure on snowmobiles right from our front door. Snow Cat Skiing, located behind the lodge on Angle Mountain will challenge most deep powder skiers and boarders on the 750 skiable acres and 1,600 vertical feet. Join one of the Dog Sled Tours at the lodge and experience the power of canine. We also provide guided snowmobile tours into Yellowstone National Park, Granite Hot Springs, the Gros Ventre wildlife area and snowmobile day trips for skiers from Jackson to TML. Togwotee Mountain Lodge is a one stop shop for all your winter fun.

During the summer Togwotee offers horseback riding through the national forest and on Angle Mountain. A fully stocked trout pond onsite is available for the kids and they can even keep the fish. Several creeks, rivers and ponds are near the lodge and full of trout. TML offers to book several activities in the Jackson Hole region for our guests from a covered wagon cookout located a short distance from the lodge to white water rafting, scenic float trips, hot air balloon rides, guided fishing trips, the rodeo and mountain bike tours.

AMENITIES & SERVICES

A convenience store and gas station are located at the lodge providing some staple items, snacks and beverages. We even rent



fishing poles at the gas station. Two hot tubs are located in the cabin area for all guests. A Pavilion with a full kitchen is available for groups and cooperate meetings. Our full kitchen can handle any catering needs.
